January Program

On Saturday, January 14, 2023, from 1-3 pm, Abigail McBride will offer a critique of members' work. This meeting will be held in person at the Montpelier Arts Center. Each member in good standing may bring up to two pieces of work for which you would like Abigail's suggestions for improvement.

Abigail McBride is a well-known, nationally recognized artist who works in a variety of media and genres. She says, "the longer I paint, the more amazed I am at how beautiful the world is." A

consummate Cape School colorist, the draftsmanship in her work is born of an academic interest in the portrait and figure. Her work blends traditional subject matter with modern design sensibilities. She is part of a new breed of perceptual painters working from direct observation, be it plein air or in the studio. Though often free of narrative, her work is grounded in the present day as a contemporary interpretation genre painting.

Ms. McBride has a reputation as a dynamic teacher and mentor. She hosts online classes with the option of joining tightly limited critique groups. She also teaches at Anne Arundel Community College and selected traveling workshops.

Ms. McBride holds a BFA from Westmont College. She has also studied at Maryland Hall for Creative Arts, the Cape Cod School of Art, the Egeli Studio, and the Incaminati. Her work has been shown in the Steamboat Art Museum, CO; the CFD Museum, Cheyenne, WY; the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts, MD; the Mitchell Art Gallery, Annapolis, MD; the Sandy Spring Museum, MD; the Academy Art Museum, MD, and the Leigh Yawkey Woodson Art Museum, WI. She has shown in a long list of juried exhibitions, including the upcoming 2023 Washington County Museum of Fine Art's Cumberland Valley Exhibit, and has received many awards for her work. Her work can be found in many private collections.

She is currently represented by the Benfield Gallery and McBride Gallery in Maryland, the Berkley Gallery in Virginia, the Egeli Gallery in Massachusetts, and the Station Gallery in Delaware.








I am new to painting and to the Laurel Art Guild. When I joined, my first meeting was a wonderful presentation by a professional photographer. He was a good speaker and I assumed that I learned a great deal from him. However, you must be able to remember good advice when given. I have a picture for which friends donated a mat and a frame. Of course, as soon as I got home, I framed my piece — which looks wonderful I may add. But one of the photographer's admonishments was: TAKE A PICTURE OF YOUR FINISHED PIECE BEFORE YOU FRAME IT. This is the best shot. You only see my ceiling light (on the right), others showed me taking the picture, or the window, or my curtains, etc. I do not want to undo all my hard work of framing, so no picture to show around. Lesson learned.
