On **Monday, September 11, 2023,** Artist **Lindsay McCulloch** will give a PowerPoint presentation about her artistic process. Our meeting will be at 7:00 pm at the Montpelier Art Center, 9652 Muirkirk Road, Laurel, MD 20708.

Lindsay McCulloch holds an MFA in Painting from Boston University and she received her MA and BA from the University of Virginia. Her work has been featured in museums and galleries in the United States and abroad, including the Joel and Lila Harnett Museum of Art at the

University of Richmond Museums in Richmond, VA; the Danforth Museum of Art in Framingham, MA; the American Poetry Museum in Washington, D.C.; Nasher Sculpture Center in Dallas, TX; Bowery Gallery in New York City, NY; Linda Matney Gallery in Williamsburg, VA; R02 Art in Dallas, TX; Fraser Gallery in Bethesda, MD; the John Rylands Library in Manchester, UK; and Casa del Lector in Madrid, Spain; among others.

McCulloch holds various awards, including a Joan Mitchell Foundation Fellowship, a Virginia Museum of Fine Arts Fellowship for Painting, and a Maryland State Arts Council Individual Artist Award. She is a two-time recipient of an Individual Artist Grant from the Arts & Humanities Council of Montgomery County. She currently resides in Maryland. Rebecca Rothey

My husband and I were fortunate enough to travel to Florence, Italy in August. Here are a few reflections and highlights:

Favorite quote: "Making art is one of the expressions of man's intelligence; it is difficult to establish its limits, reasons, necessities." Lucio Fontana, 1953

The birth of Renaissance Art: At the Cappella Brancacci one can see the Masaccio frescoes, currently, while they're being cleaned, from well lighted scaffolding just a few feet away. Following Giotto, Masaccio is the first painter to use perspective and realism to display profound human emotion. He was studied by all the Florentine painters who came after him. http://www.museumsinflorence.com/musei/Brancacci_chapel.html

Hard edges vs. soft edges: It was fascinating to observe how Renaissance painters chose one or the other and often had conflicts with each other about it. Hard edges: Botticelli (though the Primavera is a must-see highlight of any visit), Perugino, and later Bronzino. Soft: DaVinci (the pioneer), Rafael, and later the Mannerists.

Sculpture: Michelangelo's *David* (left below) and the extraordinary Mannerist sculpture the *Abduction of a Sabine* (right below) by Giambologna are examples of how sculpture, like painting, is about creating beautiful or interesting shapes in 3D versus 2D in paintings. Michelangelo designed the *David* to be observed from 40 different viewpoints and Giambologna intentionally created a spiral shape through the figures. https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Giambologna.

From craftsman to artist: Ghiberti included a self-portrait looking out at the viewer in his extraordinary *Doors of Paradise* on the Baptistery. This was the first time an artist proclaimed himself as such. https://www.worldhistory.org/.../portrait-of-lorenzo.../

Contemporary Art: A show of Yan Pei-Ming's large-scale paintings *Creating Histories* at the Palazzo Strozzi included a watercolor of a scan of his own skull painted multiple times all in red. It was a powerful way to convey his feelings about the war in Ukraine. Art can express our deepest emotions, often better than words, not just about what we love and find beautiful, but what we abhor or fear or ... https://www.palazzostrozzi.org/archivio/mostre/yan-pei-ming/

Some things never change: I got a chuckle out of how many donors and powerful patrons are recognized by being included in works of Renaissance art. Who said donor walls need to be boring brass leaves or stolid plaques?
